About Statutory Declarations

A statutory declaration is a written statement which a person swears, affirms, or declares to be true in the presence of an authorised witness – usually a Justice of the Peace, a lawyer or a notary public.

Who can witness your statutory declaration?

Your witness must:

- be on the list of approved witnesses **and** have a connection to Australia (see explanations below) **or**
- be a notary public (with or without a connection to Australia)

List of approved witnesses

As well as a Justice of the Peace, Lawyer or notary public, the following can witness your statutory declaration if they are licenced in Australia, OR if they are registered to practice their work in Australia.

- architect
- chiropractor
- dentist
- financial adviser or financial planner
- legal practitioner, with/without a practicing certificate
- medical practitioner
- midwife
- migration agent registered under Division 3 of Part 3 of the *Migration Act 1958*
- nurse
- occupational therapist
- optometrist
- patent attorney
- pharmacist
- physiotherapist
- psychologist
- trade marks attorney
- veterinary surgeon

What does “have a connection to Australia mean”?

Having a connection to Australia means the person:

- is licensed or registered to practice in Australia, or
- holds an Australian membership to a professional organisation, or
- is appointed in Australia

For example:

- a doctor who is registered to practise medicine in Australia can witness your declaration (a doctor who is not registered in Australia cannot)
- an accountant who has an Australian membership to Chartered Accountants Australia and New Zealand
