

Information about the National Training Framework

This fact sheet provides information about the National Training Framework for Temporary Traffic Management (TTM) including training categories, how to enrol, and transitioning from current training to the new National TTM Training.



Temporary traffic management roles

There are three TTM roles:

- ➔ Traffic Controller (TC)
- ➔ Traffic Management Implementer (TMI)
- ➔ Traffic Management Designer (TMD).

The roles are graduated across three TTM categories, comprising in total eight Temporary Traffic Management National Training Programs with their associated Skill Sets.

The role and where the work is being undertaken, including its complexity, determine the TTM category of training required.

What is the National Training Framework for Temporary Traffic Management?

The National Training Framework for Temporary Traffic Management provides:

- ➔ Graduated learning across the Temporary Traffic Management roles
- ➔ A structured genuine career path
- ➔ Theoretical (classroom) and practical on-the-job learning
- ➔ National recognition – individuals who have successfully completed the training requirements in one state or territory will have this training recognised in another participating state or territory. Please note, that additional localised training may be required.

How do I enrol?

- ① Choose the training path you are interested in and which reflects your career plans. You can obtain further information at austroroads.info/ttm-training. Remember to consider all your options. For example, you may be able to undertake a combined training course in Traffic Controller 1 and Traffic Management Implementer 1.
- ② Check the entry requirements. There are entry requirements before you can enrol in TTM Category 2 or TTM Category 3 training. If you are not sure about entry requirements check with an Approved Training Provider (ATP) or refer to information in each of the Temporary Traffic Management Skill Sets at austroroads.info/ttm-training.

- ③ Select an Approved Training Provider (ATP) to complete your training. An ATP is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) that has been approved by the state or territory regulator to deliver temporary traffic management training under the National Training Framework for TTM.

A list of ATPs is available from your state or territory regulator or from the Austroads website.



ATPs are identified by the national TTM logo.

How much does a course cost?

Temporary traffic management course costs vary. Please contact an ATP for course information including fees and course dates.

Is training subsidised?

Please check with your state or territory or an ATP.

Are Temporary Traffic Management Skill Sets recognised nationally?

If you successfully complete the training requirements in one state or territory, your qualifications will be recognised in other participating state or territories. Please note there may be additional training requirements in states and territories specific to the jurisdiction. This is localised content which may be referred to as gap training and ensures understanding of subtle differences in legislation and signage within a state or territory.

What if I am already working in the industry?

If you have current industry experience and skills, you may apply for Recognition of Prior Learning. Please contact an ATP to commence this process.

Do I have to complete a refresher course?

You will need to renew your certification within 3-years of being issued the Statement of Attainment. You can do this by completing refresher training.

To be eligible to complete a refresher course you must meet the following criteria:

- Your training date must not have expired (e.g. if your training was completed on 1 January 2023, your training expiry date will be 1 January 2026).
- You hold the skill sets for the refresher training you wish to complete (e.g. to complete the refresher course for Traffic Controller 1 you must hold the current skill sets for Traffic Controller 1).
- You can demonstrate you have current industry experience and skills.
